

HONOLULU, HAWAII

The Semester at Sea Field Program has a strong academic component. Faculty members develop field requirements that constitute 20% of the contact hours for each course they are teaching. As part of these field requirements, all Semester at Sea faculty design and lead field trips that integrate with their course work. The following is a representative sampling of the types of Faculty-Directed Practica (FDPs) that may be offered during this voyage:

BISHOP MUSEUM [FDP: ANTHROPOLOGY]

Located on a beautiful campus surrounded by gardens of tropical plants and birds, the Bishop Museum in Honolulu is regarded as one of the world's best museums of Polynesian culture. The holdings on display cover Hawaiian culture before Western contact as well as more contemporary history. The second and third floors of the museum cover 19th century Hawaii and the various ethnic groups that comprise the state's present-day society and culture. These exhibits depict the history of the colonization of Hawaii, the importation of Asian labor to work on the plantations, and the influence of American missionaries on Hawaiian society. From the museum, you may return to the ship by taxi or bus or are free to stay in town on your own. (PRICE: 21.00)

HONOLULU ACADEMY OF ART [FDP: ART HISTORY]

We will travel by taxi to this beautiful and accessible museum that displays one of the best collections of Asian and Oceanic art in the world. The Honolulu Academy of Arts is dedicated to the collection, preservation, interpretation and teaching of the visual arts, and the presentation of exhibitions, films and videos, performing arts and public programs specifically relevant to Hawaii's ethnically diverse community. We will visit this museum and be escorted by a guide who will walk us through the exhibits, ranging from Neolithic to contemporary. (PRICE: \$7.00)

The remaining trips in the Semester at Sea Field Program provide a variety of opportunities for students to enhance their overall study abroad experience. Students can visit sites of historical and cultural interest; learn about local environmental, political, economic and social issues; interact with local university students and other residents; become involved in community service; explore what is unique in each country; and enjoy some recreational activities. The following is a representative sampling of standard field trips that may be offered during this voyage:

PEARL HARBOR/ARIZONA MEMORIAL & CITY TOUR

This deeply moving experience begins with a visit to Pearl Harbor's *Arizona* Memorial and Visitor's Center. The *Arizona* Memorial commemorates the December 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor and sits atop the sunken hull of the USS *Arizona*. Before taking the Navy launch to the memorial, you will view a short video on the attack. After your visit to Pearl Harbor, continue with a drive through historic downtown Honolulu where you will see the Iolani Palace, King Kamehameha Statue, the State Capitol, Kawaiahao Church, Mission Houses and the Punchbowl National Cemetery where more than 25,000 soldiers are buried. Please Note: 'No-Bags-Allowed' Policy – Strict measures are in place as to what can be taken onto a military base. No purses, handbags, fanny packs, backpacks, camera bags, diaper bags, luggage or other items that have any concealment are allowed at the Visitor's Center or the Arizona Memorial. These items can be left on the motor coach. Shirt and shoes must be worn, and no swimsuits are permitted. (PRICE: \$30.00)



STARS AND STRIPES

Visit the sites where World War II began and ended for the United States. View a short video before taking the Navy launch to visit the *Arizona* Memorial in Pearl Harbor. Then travel to the battleship USS *Missouri* for a tour of the site where the armistice ending the war was signed. Continue with a drive through the Punchbowl National Cemetery and Historic Honolulu. Drive by Iolani Palace, the only royal palace on American soil; Mission Houses; the State Library and City Hall. (A stop will be made for lunch, at your own expense.) Please Note: 'No-Bags-Allowed' Policy – Strict measures are in place as to what can be taken onto a military base. No purses,

handbags, fanny packs, backpacks, camera bags, diaper bags, luggage or other items that have any concealment are allowed at the Visitor's Center, the Arizona Memorial or the *USS Missouri*. These items can be left on the motor coach. Shirt and shoes must be worn, and no swimsuits are permitted. (PRICE: \$63.00)

OAHU GRAND CIRCLE ISLAND TOUR

This popular field trip takes you on a 120-mile trip around the beautiful island of Oahu. Enjoy the ride along the slopes of Diamond Head and see Hanauma Bay, Sandy Beach, Nuuanu Pali Lookout, Byodo-In Temple, the North Shore surfing beaches (Sunset and Pipeline) and Waimea Bay. Photo stops will be made along the way. Continue with a visit to the Dole Plantation for a stroll through the Plantation Gardens. (A stop will be made for lunch, at your own expense.) (PRICE: \$61.00)

DIAMOND HEAD, RAINFOREST & SCENIC SHORES

This field trip features Mt. Tantalus, Nuuanu Pali and scenic south island beaches via a premier mini-coach. It is specially designed to take in many of the most scenic vistas and natural attractions of Oahu in just a few hours. Enjoy the view from Amelia Earhart Lookout on the slopes of Diamond Head. Ascend into the rainforest at the top of Mt. Tantalus. The panorama from Puu Ualakaa State Wayside is outstanding, and the views of Diamond Head, Waikiki and Honolulu are magnificent. View the Queen Emma Summer Palace and continue up into the cool, lush rainforest of Nuuanu Valley along Pali Drive. Experience the summit of Nuuanu Pali Lookout. Amidst gusting winds, encounter the glorious vista of windward Oahu. Then enjoy the sea air and blustery trade winds along the coastline past Makapuu Point and Sandy Beach, to the Halona Blowhole. See the landmark Koko Head Crater and the beautiful Hanauma Bay, the incomparable marine preserve nestled in its own half-sunken volcanic crater. (PRICE: \$33.00)

POLYNESIAN CULTURAL CENTER

The Polynesian Cultural Center is located on a 42-acre site in Laie on the windward side of Oahu, approximately one hour from Waikiki. Experience the seven South Sea cultures that collectively shaped Hawaii. Within this 42-acre site you can visit Tonga, Tahiti, the Marquesas, Fiji, New Zealand (Aotearoa), Samoa and Hawaii. Each village authentically depicts the lifestyle of its people and offers interactive entertainment and unsurpassed Polynesian-style hospitality that delights visitors of all ages. With your Polynesian Cultural Center Regular Package admission you will have plenty of time to explore the seven villages and to watch the famous 'Pageant of the Long Canoes' and visit the IMAX Theater. The highlight of your visit is sure to be 'Horizons', the largest Polynesian song-and-dance revue in the world featuring over 100 native performers from all corners of the Pacific. Dressed in traditional native costume, these Polynesians share their history, traditions and spirit through song and dance the same way their ancestors did. (Meals are not included.) (PRICE: \$125.00)
